

Included will be a visit to the University of Central America where six Jesuits, their house-keeper and her daughter were killed.

In Guatemala, the participants will visit beautiful Santiago Atitlan where Fr. Stan Rother from the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City gave his life for his Mayan Indian parishioners.

All this and much more will be experienced during this ten day spiritual event by those who make this Pilgrimage/Retreat journey.
